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MISSION

ROMKids transforms lives by helping children and youth understand the past, make sense of the present, and come together to shape our collective future. We foster learning, create knowledge, share global collections and research, and spark creative multidisciplinary exchange on topics within the intersecting worlds of art, culture, and nature.

Children and youth will be inspired by engaging, diverse, and thoughtful educators; hands-on and experiential learning; imaginative art projects, activities, and experiments; and unique access to galleries, collections, and ROM experts.

ROMKids encourages community through accessible and inclusive teaching practices to help children and youth find a rewarding and safe place to explore, learn, and grow.

HISTORY OF ROMKIDS



ROMKids began in 1938 with the formation of Saturday Club and is widely regarded in the industry as the first official museum camp.

Ruth Home, the first Camp Director, believed that museums should belong to everyone, including women and children, and created the camp with the support of donations from the community, an art studio from the Palaeontology Department, and the teaching support of Sylvia Hahn, an artist at ROM.

Summer Club followed in 1942. March Break Camp started in 1998, and ROMKids Jr furthered the mission in 2008.

ROMKIDS TEAM



Group Ratios

Children to staff ratios are 6:1 for 5-year-olds, 8:1 for 6-7-year-olds, and 10:1 for children 8-years and older.

Group Instructor

Each group is run by an instructor that holds a degree or diploma in a related field and has experience working with children. Instructors are responsible for researching, planning, and teaching lessons based on the ROMKids mission around the galleries and collections at ROM.

Camp Assistant

Assistants are mainly senior secondary school or university students with extensive experience working with kids in educational settings. Each group has one to two assistants who are often at the lockers signing campers in or helping with various camp needs in their colourful staff shirt.

Volunteers

Each group has two or more volunteers to provide additional support.





AGES 4-5



All Grown Up

How does a tadpole become a frog? How does a sapling become a tree? How did kids grow up in ancient times? Join us as we examine biodiversity's babies and antiquity's adolescents. Traverse Egypt and test out some ancient games, journey to China and find out what kids learned in school, and brave the Bat Cave to investigate the lifecycle of our upside-down friends.

Animal Antics

Go wild at ROM this summer as we encounter the amazing antics of nature's most awesome animals. Explore the animal kingdom as you scan the savannah for bison and antelope, or uncover what's lurking in your own backyard. We'll head to the Life in Crisis: Schad Gallery of Biodiversity to meet some fascinating wildlife and gain an understanding of where they live, what they eat, and who they hang out with.

Earth Worms

Welcome little worms! Did you know earthworms are nature's doctors? They help the planet stay healthy and so can you! Learn all about why our planet and animal friends need our help and find out all the awesome ways you can keep our earth happy. Then, march with penguins through icy Antarctica and slither with snakes through the scorching Sahara. Examine Earth's extraordinary climates and beautiful biodiversity with trips to the animal gallery. Travel back in time and visit the Willner Madge Gallery, Dawn of Life and the James and Louise Temerty Galleries of Age of Dinosaurs to learn all about the animals of the past. Join us as we wiggle and worm our way around the world!



Mini Myths

Prepare for an adventure of mythical proportions as we set sail on a journey into the world of fictional follies. Dangerous dragons, herculean heroes, and gargantuan gods are what await in this interactive story experience. Travel to Greece, Egypt, China and more as we uncover the great myths of the ancient world. Meet the monsters behind the myths, and enter into the most fantastic fables history has to offer.

Wild Things

From scaly snakes to bustling beetles to daring dinosaurs – the Museum is full of all kinds of fascinating creatures. Using artwork, creative play, costumes, and real scientific specimens, you'll examine the animal kingdom as you learn about the amazing biodiversity that roams our world. It's everything you need to know about your favourite wild (and not so wild) animals!





AGES 6-7

Above and Beyond

Up, up, and away! Get ready for a session full of looking above our heads and beyond the horizon. We delve into the impressive innovations that are being engineered by the world's greatest minds. Investigate the work that is being done to travel to Mars, how scientists study the depths of the ocean, and the climate research conducted in the arctic each day. Then, put on your astronaut suit as we explore space: the final frontier. Learn about the storied past of space exploration, Canada's role on the International Space Station, and what the future of deep space research looks like.



Budding Artist

Why do tigers have stripes? Why do chameleons change colour? Why are butterflies bright and moths not? Take in all that nature has to offer on this artscapade around ROM. Visit the Patrick and Barbara Keenan Family Gallery of Hands-On Biodiversity and meet the multicoloured animals from around our world, and then visit the special exhibition, *Nature in Brilliant Colour*, to answer these questions. Head to the Teck Suite of Galleries: Earth's Treasures and dig up the planet's most precious gems, then take a flight to Egypt and be amazed by the vibrant jewellery made from these stones. Draw dinosaurs, paint penguins, and sketch the stars as we gain inspiration from the beauty around us for some nature-themed art. Grab your paintbrushes, pens, and wildest ideas on this journey through the ROM!



Dig This

Dig into the natural world and ancient history to find out what buried treasures lay below us! From the prehistoric fossils that line the Museum and the natural resources that fuel our homes, to the ancient cities that mystify us, our Earth is filled with amazing wonders just waiting to be uncovered. Examine and experiment your way to a better understanding of where our world came from, where it's going, and how we can preserve it.



Monster's on the Move

Calling all monster hunters! We're searching for some of the world's most famous mythical creatures. Find out how dragons became feared and revered throughout Europe and Asia, and how stories of sea monsters kept people from swimming. We'll answer the riddles of the mysterious sphinx, dive for Nessie, and search the forest for a Sasquatch sighting. Then, uncover the potential origins and inspiration behind these fantastical tales. Get ready to devour lore from around the world as we find monsters on the move!



AGES 6-7



Science Sleuths

Have you ever wanted to be a scientist and solve the mysteries of everyday life? Well, here's your chance! Conduct simple experiments to find out why the sky is blue, why leaves change colour in the fall, and what paper airplane design flies the farthest. Your investigations will take you from the microscopic level of the cell to the cosmic level of the stars.

Pharaohs and Friends



From pharaohs to tsars to queens and beyond! Put on your crown and get ready to learn all about the different types of royalty from around the world. Join us on a royal escapade around the Museum as we trek to Greece's democratic cities, travel to Iran's ancient empires, and traverse the sands of Egypt to learn the histories and hear the stories of past rulers and their people.



Suit Yourself

Fashion yourself a trunk full of costumes as you take an imaginative journey through the galleries. Learn how different cultures clothed themselves through history and take inspiration from the natural world of prints and patterns. We will visit the Samuel European Galleries to investigate the protective armour of knights and the colours of royalty. Then, we'll head to the special exhibition, *Nature in Brilliant Colour*, to see if we can spot nature's vibrant critters and creatures. Using paint, paper, fabric and more, you'll create outfits and accessories to suit yourself in this crazy costume caper!



Worldly Wonders

Embark on an expedition that takes you to the world's many wonders! From the Great Wall of China to the Acropolis of Athens to the soaring CN Tower, get ready to delve into the compelling history of world-famous cultural landmarks. Then, find out about the impressive forces of nature that have created earth's most fascinating phenomena. Swim with the fish in Australia's Great Barrier Reef and light up the sky with the Aurora Borealis to learn the science behind Mother Nature's miracles. Join us as we trek through the many galleries at the Museum and be inspired by magnificent marvels for your very own landmark creation.



AGES 8–10

Art Moves

These boots are made for walking, so put on your snazziest pair as we move around Toronto's exciting cultural sites. Galleries in and beyond ROM will inspire you to expand your portfolio and develop artistic skills through studies in sketching, painting, collage, and sculpture. Get moving as you travel through the Museum and to some of the city's hidden artistic treasures while developing your visual arts skills.



Ancient Odyssey

Prepare for a voyage of mythic proportions through ancient times and places! Each day you'll have a new quest to fulfill as you uncover the myths and legends of the Celts, Romans, Greeks, Egyptians, and more. Wander into the world of the Ramayana and hear about Rama's journey and meet Gilgamesh on his epic escapade. Follow the Labours of Herakles, join the Argonauts on their hunt for the Golden Fleece, or search for the Holy Grail. All this adventure will inspire you to create monsters, legends, and myths on your own hero's journey.



Day in the Life

Spend a day in the life of people past and present! Travel back in time and discover what it was like to live during ancient times. Become a pharaoh and rule over ancient Egypt, don your knight's armour and prepare for battle, and uncover the hierarchies of civilizations past. Fast forward to the future and sample the best the Museum has to offer as we focus on the historians and scientists who revealed these times gone by. Visit the diverse galleries at ROM and learn from expert scientists and researchers in the world of archaeology, palaeontology, anthropology, and more.



Dynamic Planet

We all have a part to play in the care of our planet. Studying specimens from the galleries at ROM, learn how life is diverse, interrelated, and in crisis. Travel through ecosystems and study the interconnections of species and habitats. Then, help save our planet and learn how your daily decisions can make a difference in the conservation of the environment.



AGES 8–10

Going for Gold

Ready, Set, GO! Join us on an expedition of international proportions as we sample the games, challenges, pastimes, and contests of skill from years long past. Learn all about the Indigenous beginnings of Canada's national sport – lacrosse. Gallop through the Samuel European Galleries and don a suit of armour for a riveting jousting challenge. Find out how a mythological weaving competition led to some creepy crawly consequences. Work with your team, test your skills, and have fun as you participate in your very own competitions and crafts.

This group will be playing games outdoors. Please ensure campers bring a water bottle, sunscreen, and hat every day.



Into the Unknown

Put on your space suit as we rocket to the farthest reaches of our solar system, journey to the dark side of the moon, and explore the methane clouds of Venus. Then shuttle back to Earth as we venture into the faraway places of land and sea, from the loneliest depths of the ocean to the frozen tundra of the north. Track down Point Nemo, the furthest point of water from other land masses, and find out just how far pollution reaches. Trek up Mount Everest and learn what this difficult expedition entails. We uncover all we can about these unknown vistas and why they are so difficult to study. Then, we'll take our learnings and create a diorama of our own unknown world.

Mondo Mixed Media

Can't decide whether to fulfill your flare for the artistic or test your inquiring mind? Why not do both in this exciting take on the classic Summer Club experience. Sample a smorgasbord of topics inspired by the galleries, collections, and research at ROM. Visit the special exhibition, *Nature in Brilliant Colour*, and analyze Mother Nature's vibrant flora and fauna. Spend your mornings roaming the Museum and find art and cultures that will inspire your own artistic creations. Then trek through the galleries and beyond in the afternoon to uncover a world of scientific investigation.



Palaeoquest

From the origins of life to the first flight of dinosaurs to the rise of humans, palaeontology covers a vast amount of awe-inspiring science and history. Examine the world-class collection of fossils at ROM – spanning hundreds of millions of years. Learn about the cutting-edge research the Museum is conducting on prehistoric life, and find out how palaeontologists preserve, piece together, and study their finds. How did life begin? Are dinosaurs truly extinct? Can Ice Age beasts be brought back to life? Find out in Palaeoquest!

AGES 8–10

ROMbrandt

Put on your smock and get ready for an art-filled session! Be inspired by the decorative amphorae of Greece, the stunning textiles of Ghana, and the eye-catching butterflies in *Life in Crisis: Schad Gallery of Biodiversity*, as we paint like Picasso and colour like Carr. We will get inspiration from the special exhibition, *Saints, Sinners, Lovers, and Fools: 300 Years of Flemish Masterworks*, as we examine the world of Dutch renaissance art. Then, grab a mirror and try your hand at self-portraiture – just like the man himself – Rembrandt. Join us on an artistic endeavour through the Museum!

ROM RPG

Paladins, pixies, and Pegasus galore! Create your character, carefully strategize, and choose your own ROM-venture on this journey through the magical galleries in the Museum. Explore the *Life in Crisis: Schad Gallery of Biodiversity* and meet the real-life animals that inspired the many monsters of mythology. Trek through the cultural galleries and listen to the stories of heroes' past for some tips and tricks in your own campaign. Will you best Medusa's stoney gaze or will it be a hard rock life for your character? Can you spot the Jinn before they sneak up on you, or will its trickster nature fool you? Grab your D20 and roll for initiative on this journey of epic proportions!



About Time



We talk all about time on this exploration of what is left behind!

All the ROM's a Stage

Our special theatre school will draw on the Museum's rich and dramatic backdrop to enhance your acting abilities through training in voice, movement, expression and dialogue. Architreks




Blank Canvas

Delve into the stories painted on Greek amphorae and the tales woven into Indigenous textiles. Fill your canvas and craft something unforgettable at ROM this summer.



AGES 11–14



Deep Dive

Curious minds wanted on this exploration of the captivating and confounding. Be prepared each day to dive deep into a different theme revolving around the vast collections at ROM. Analyze the skulls of australopithecines and hominids and learn the amazing effects of evolution. Engage in experiential archaeology and find out the fascinating ways ancient peoples moved large columns and obelisks. Fly to Mars and meet the rovers that are working hard for our scientists here on Earth. Get the unique chance to meet ROM experts in the field who are breaking ground on these intriguing topics.



Dungeons & Dragons

Delve into a legendary world where YOU create the story. Tour the Museum and uncover the real-life inspirations behind popular table-top role-playing games as we study biodiversity, ancient cultures, artifacts, weapons, and more! Then, join a ROM-inspired campaign full of magical beasts, mystical arts, and unsolved mysteries. Create characters, strategize, and try to stay on the Dungeon Master's good side on this journey into imagination!

Force of Nature

The world needs our help! The climate crisis is posing a serious threat to the world around us. Ice caps are melting, sea levels are rising, and wildlife are in danger. Together we will trek through the diverse galleries at in the Museum to learn more about the Earth's vast and interrelated ecosystems, meet the planet's endangered animals, and learn the science behind the climate crisis. Then, join us in detecting ways you can reduce your carbon footprint through daily sustainable practices. Become a force for nature and learn all about how you can use your voice and action to promote positive change in the world.



Generation Why?

Journey across the Museum as we examine how major historical movements and eras shaped the generations of people to come. Learn how oral stories and histories transcend generations with trips to the Daphne Coxwell Gallery dedicated to First People Art and Culture, the Gallery of Greece, and the Joey and Toby Tanenbaum Gallery of China. Travel through time and check out the fads and fashions of the trendiest eras. Find out how the race to the moon influenced Atomic Age design and the meaning behind the many colours of Ancient Egypt. Appreciate and learn about second wave feminism and the rise of the civil rights movement. At the end of our session, we look toward the future – what do we wish for the newest generation, Generation Alpha?

Matter of Fact

Fact: The climate crisis is real, the Earth is round, and humans landed on the moon.

Fiction: Aliens built the pyramids, sharks don't get cancer, and the world is run by a secret illuminati organization.



The world is full of false statements, conspiracy theories, and deceptive information, so let's break it down. Put on your critical thinking cap as we separate fact from fiction and examine what strategies we can use to deduce the truth. Learn all about history's hoaxes – from the Patagonian Giants to the infamous War of the Worlds radiocast to the trickery of the Piltown Man. Then, look at social media and delve into how quickly misinformation can spread. It is all a matter of fact in this group as we join together to make sure the truth prevails!

Breaking news! Breaking news! ROM's junior reporters give you the inside scoop! Grab your notebook and put on your inquiring brain to prepare for a journalism-centred session. In an action-packed two weeks, we'll craft new tales about ancient objects, create fun and informative vlogs, and interview specialists in topics ranging from art to science. Learn about the responsibility of journalism, where to find the best sources, what journalistic integrity really means, and why it's important in today's world. There are so many stories within the Museum's walls – pick your favourite and we will find the best way to tell it!

PREPARING FOR CAMP



Morning Drop-off

- Camp drop-off is from 8:10 – 9:00 am.
- Please enter the Museum via the President's Choice School Entrance on the south side of the building. Go down the small set of stairs between the Museum and the Planetarium building and through the first set of glass doors on the right.
- Summer Club staff will be waiting alongside the Weston Entrance on Queen's Park. They can escort your child into the Museum each morning. We strongly recommend entering with your child on the first day to ensure all health, pickup, and attendance details are accurate.
- If it is your first time attending camp, we suggest arriving earlier to allow your child time to acclimate to the environment and our staff.
- Morning arrival movies take place between 8:10 – 9:00 am while campers arrive. Movies consist of child-friendly short films, educational documentaries, or previous camper video creations.

Snack and Lunch

- Children must bring their own snacks and lunch to camp. Please ensure you pack enough for a busy day of camp.
- Please note that we are a nut aware camp. Foods containing nuts (ie. peanut butter, Nutella, granola, trail mix, etc.) are **not** permitted. If you are sending an alternate butter (ie. Wow Butter, Sun Butter, etc), we kindly ask that your child be aware or include a note in the lunch box informing staff of the alternative.

Pick-up

- Photo ID must be provided at pickup every day. Camper sign-out will be at the lockers just inside the President's Choice School Entrance doors each day.
- Please ensure that all possible pick-up names are provided and appear correctly on the attendance (including the person registering). If a name is not provided, the primary contact will be called for confirmation before your child is released to them.
- We do not permit children to leave unattended. If your child is 11– 14 years of age, they can leave on their own with a signed note or parental/guardian signoff.
- Please note that pickup in the hallway can feel congested. We appreciate your patience during sign-out.
- Children must be picked up promptly after programs or extended care. Late fees apply.

Extended Care

- Extended care is from 4:00 – 6:00 pm.
- Children will enjoy relaxed play or an engaging movie.
- A limited number of spots are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Please consult the fee schedule and be sure to check off the appropriate section on the registration form
- If your child is left beyond 6:00 pm you will be subject to a late fee of \$1.00 per minute.

Parking

There is no parking available at the Museum. Please refer to the Location and Parking webpage on rom.ca for more information. There is a school bus loading zone along Queen's Park on the east side of the Museum where you may drop-off and pick-up your children briefly. Parking your car in this area and/or blocking the TTC stop are considered by the police to be parking violations and you may be ticketed. The Museum assumes no responsibility for such violations, nor can we assist you with parking tickets.

Behaviour Policy

At ROM, we believe every child has the right to a safe, enjoyable, and educational experience. We therefore expect and encourage each participant to maintain a positive and appropriate level of conduct. Our staff and volunteers are respectful of the right of each child to be treated in a fair, consistent manner and strive to create an environment where our campers are encouraged to safely express themselves without fear of punishment or disapproval. We expect campers to act with empathy, respect their peers, and always stay with a staff member.

We take a proportional, stepped approach to behaviour:

Minor Behaviour – Staff will try to ascertain why the behaviour is occurring with the child. Staff will gently remind the child about program expectations

Repeated Minor Behaviour – Staff will speak privately with the child about their behaviour and try to collaboratively work out strategies for better cooperation with the group. A short, supervised cool-down period may be given to allow the child to regulate before rejoining the rest of the campers. Caregivers will be informed and asked to reinforce proper program etiquette and expectations. In cases of persisting behaviour, staff may temporarily bring the child to the ROMKids office to discuss behaviour.

Behaviour Policy (continued)

Serious Misbehaviours (refusal to cooperate, roughness) – Child will discuss behaviour with Office Staff and prepare an action plan to remedy behaviour. Caregivers will be notified and involved. If behaviour recurs, the child may be asked to leave the program without refund.

Major Offenses –To ensure a safe and enjoyable camp, we do not allow:

- Belittling or demeaning words, behaviour or actions
 - Discriminatory words or actions against protected groups (ie. 2SLGBTQIA+, race, gender, disability, ancestry, colour, creed, age, or any other identity)
 - Theft
 - Unsafe behaviour to self or others, including physical altercations or violence
 - Prohibited items: inappropriate or offensive pictures/materials
 - Dangerous possessions (knives, weapons, alcohol, illicit drugs)
- If any of these occur at camp or any behaviour that is deemed greatly unsafe to the child, staff, peers, or Museum, the child will immediately be withdrawn from the group and will discuss their behaviour with the Camp Directors. Caregivers are notified immediately. Reparations to property made and police involved if necessary. Child may be immediately and permanently removed from the program without refund.
- Our camp believes all behaviour starts with communication, as such, we will make every effort to work with our campers and caregivers to find a solution whenever possible. If your child has known behaviour either due to a formal diagnosis or as part of their current stage in life, we would appreciate a confidential discussion in-person, or over the phone, to ensure your child is successfully integrated into our program.

Health and Safety

Epi-pens, Inhalers, & Other Medications – Campers who have prescribed epi-pens, inhalers, or other medications must bring them to and carry them on their person each day of camp. Please ensure that the Emergency Plan for medical emergencies has been filled out prior to arrival at camp. Medications are not to be given to campers by camp staff. If your child requires medication during camp hours, please contact the ROMKids office.

Communicable Diseases – If your camper has a reportable or non-reportable communicable disease, please inform the office as soon as possible and keep your child home from camp.

These include –

- Pink eye (conjunctivitis), strep throat, chicken pox, flu, lice, hand, foot and mouth disease, measles, coronaviruses (SARS, COVID-19, MERS), pertussis (whooping cough), tuberculosis (TB), or other unlisted communicable diseases.

Symptoms to watch out for include but are not excluded to –

- Fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath, decreased or loss of taste or smell, runny nose or nasal congestion, headache, extreme fatigue, sore throat, muscle aches or joint pain, gastrointestinal symptoms (such as vomiting or diarrhea), itchy scalp or rash on body, red eyes, swollen lymph nodes.

If symptoms of a communicable disease are displayed at camp, the camper may be asked to wear a mask and moved to a separate, supervised room. A parent/guardian will be contacted immediately to determine next steps.

Hand sanitizer will be available in all classrooms and around the Museum. If you do not want your child using alcohol-based hand sanitizer, please inform the staff in your child's group.

Reporting a positive (+) communicable disease case

If your child tests positive (+) –

- Please phone 416 586 8043 or email studio@rom.on.ca and inform the ROMKids office as soon as possible for next steps.
- Upon receipt of positive result, the ROMKids office will inform potential close contacts within the camp. Personal information (ie. name) surrounding positive test results will stay anonymous outside of the ROMKids office.
